Scargill . . . he raps "gross interference"

MINERS' leader Arthur Scargill yesterday blasted The Sun for conducting a ballot on his

pit union's contraversial overtime ban.

He called it "gross interference in the affairs of a democratic and independent union."

Mr Scargill branded the ballot form in yesterday's paper as "disgraceful" and said he had contacted his lawyers.

He added: "The data published by The Sun is highly damaging."

As Mr Scargill hit out, pitmen, their wives and Coal Board chief Ian MacGregor piled on the pressure for a secret ballot on the

secret ballot on the overtime ban, which has already cost miners £30 million in wages.

One of the angry wives. Christine Postill, stressed that Mr Scargill had not lost a penny of his own £550-a-week salary.

Her husband John, 43, a security officer at Mr Scargill's old Woolley pit in West Yorks, is nearly £1,000 down.

Mrs Postill said: "It makes me mad when Scargill doesn't have these financial worries, but is prepared to let us suffer."
